LEARNING THE SECRETS OF HEALING IN ANCIENT CHINA

S tudying traditional Chinese medicine at the source, where it began thousands of years ago, is exciting for five local students who are heading for an intensive learning stint at a Chinese university in December.

Annie Gao, Basil Jung, Kean Tang and Radmila Domanovic of Auckland and Becs Arahanga of Wellington are scheduled for some rigorous training in practical skills at the Hubei University of Chinese Medicine in Wuhan City.

Radmila, originally from Croatia, has a background in chemistry and technology. She says she does not want to miss this opportunity. Completing her Diploma in Sports Massage (Neuro Mascular Therapy) and Diploma in Reflexology at New Zealand College of Massage, Radmilla is particularly interested to learn the Chinese approach to medical examination, and manual lymphatic massage.

Mother of five, Becs of Ngati Raukawa tribal ancestry prefers to describe her anticipated experience in the words of her old people: "Whaaia te iti kahurangi. Ki te tuohu koe, me he maunga teitei". Translated, it means: "Pursue excellence – should you stumble, let it be to a lofty mountain".

Becs, who is undertaking Bachelor of Health Science in Acupuncture, comes from a colourful working background, including seasonal work to adventure tourism, retail, and film work. But nothing has fired her passion as training to be a healer. "I am keen to study Chinese medicine at its birthplace," she says.

Malaysian Chinese, Kean Tang, has Bachelor in Business Administration from the University of Arkansas, USA. This is her first year studying Chinese medicine. She believes the clinical experience she is about to gain at Hubei will prepare her better for her second-year courses. "Of course, I'm expecting to see and learn something I will not be able to learn from books," she adds. Basil, a former banker in Korea for twenty years and Hungary for five, speaks for all the students when he lays out the four areas of learning he expects to gain from his stint in Hubei. One is to get "a feel" for the medical environment and the medical equipment they use at the University.

"I want to view their actual clinical practices, to confirm what I have already learned and being able to compare the theory as taught in New Zealand with the practice in China," says Basil, adding that he also wants to examine the level of reliance on Chinese herbs in the clinical treatment of diseases. "An area I can't measure in New Zealand," he adds.

Lastly, Basil would like to see how TCM and western clinics co-operate on treating the same patient.

As Becs says in translating another Maori wisdom: "My success is not mine alone but one that belongs to the collective'.
